



- Requirement for high protection.

Economic-

- Poor cash flow in the market.
- Significant slowing down in the revenue growth.

Social-

- Service sector is not being able to provide their proper service.
- Cancellation or postponement of large-scale sports and tournaments.
- Avoiding the national and international travelling and cancellation of services.
- Disruption of celebration of cultural, religious and festive events.







INTERNAL HACKATH


WORLD FOLIC ACID AWARENESS WEEK (JAN 9th-15th)

St. Pauls College Of Pharmacy is keen in raising awareness on world Folic Acid Awareness Week, Every year (January 9th-15th this year) is noted on which outlines on importance of Folic Acid before and during pregnancy, whose deficiency may lead to neural tube defects, placenta abruption (placenta separates from uterus). When the baby is developing early during pregnancy, Folic Acid helps form the neural tube. Folic Acid is very important because it can help prevent some major birth defects of the baby's brain (Anencephaly) and spine (Spina Bifida). The neural tube forms the early brain and spine. 


NATIONAL GLAUCOMA AWARENESS MONTH-JANUARY

We know that every single one of us has the ability to make a difference, large or small, and that together we can make real progress in Reducing the global impact of Cancer.








CELEBRATIONS








NATIONAL SCIENCE DAY 28th FEB




INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY 8th MARCH











REPUBLIC DAY 26th JAN






INDO-US INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE 21th &22nd JAN

NATIONAL SEMINAR (VIRTUAL MODE) ON 19th FEB


